President's Message

One of the most rewarding experiences as President of the Louisiana Bar Foundation (LBF) has been to meet so many of our generous and hardworking Fellows, judges and lawyers, and grantees across the state. Our Fellows truly understand the importance of access to justice and legal representation for everyone in Louisiana. If everyone is subject to the rule of law, then everyone must have access to the courts. Our dedicated volunteer Fellows exemplify the highest ideals of our profession. Our grantees provide legal aid to women, children, the elderly, people with disabilities, the newly unemployed, those facing loss of their homes, and those in need of government services provided by law. These organizations make a critical difference in the lives of countless Louisiana citizens who have limited means.



As the largest funder of legal aid in the state, we have awarded more than

\$40 million to deserving non-profit organizations to help meet legal needs since 1989. In November 2009, the Board approved more than \$5 million in funding to be distributed over 18 months. These grants were made in the areas of legal assistance to the poor, law related education, loan repayment assistance, building capital development, community partnership panels and children's legal services.

Much of our work this year has been dedicated to children, the most vulnerable members of society. We established the Children's Legal Services Fund to provide special grants to give children access to special education and health-care services, mental health and foster care services. In addition, the fund provides support for advocacy in administrative and legal proceedings and impacts litigation and systemic legal reform on behalf of children. In a truly historic move forward, the Bar Foundation now serves as the administrator for the State and the Supreme Court for the Child in Need of Care (CINC) Program, which provides legal representation to all children in foster care.

We now have nine Community Partnership Panels operating across the state. In addition to providing a local presence in communities, these regional chapters help direct funding through a flexible grants process. Our newest panel, the Bayou Region CPP, chaired by Judge Jim McClelland, was established earlier this year and encompasses Lafourche, Terrebonne and St. Mary parishes. Our other eight panels are operating in Acadiana, Capital Area, Central, Greater Orleans, Northeast, Northwest, North Shore and Southwest. I encourage you to contact your local panel if you are aware of any new projects or services that would benefit from this flexible LBF funding.

And finally, the Southwest Louisiana Bar Association (SWLBA) and local volunteer leaders in partnership with the LBF's Southwest CPP founded the Southwest Louisiana Bar Foundation. The SWLBA will help remove barriers and provide access to the justice system and will support worthy causes of a charitable nature related to the legal profession in the five parishes surrounding the Lake Charles area. The LBF Southwest Community Partnership Panel provided initial funding for the foundation.

In closing, I want to thank all of the individuals who have supported the Foundation during my year as President, especially, Herschel Richard, Mathile Abramson, Patricia Krebs and Leo Hamilton. It is an honor and a privilege to serve this collegial, effective and important organization. It makes me proud to be a Louisiana Bar Foundation Fellow and a lawyer.

Distinguished Jurist Frank J. Polozola

The Honorable Frank J. Polozola is a United States District Judge for the Middle District of Louisiana. As an undergraduate, Judge Polozola attended Louisiana State University on an athletic scholarship where he was a two year letterman and was a member of the 1961 Southeastern Conference Champion baseball team. He attended LSU Law School, where he received his J.D. in 1965. In 1987, he was inducted into the LSU Law School Hall of Fame. More recently, he was inducted into the Order of Coif.

Funding Overview

As the largest funder of legal aid in the state, the Louisiana Bar Foundation (LBF) makes grants to organizations that provide free legal aid to women, children, the elderly, people with disabilities, the newly unemployed, those facing loss of their homes and those in need of guidance to secure food stamps. We offer four types of funding: annual/sustaining funds; discretionary funds; special initiatives; and scholarships, fellowships and awards.

The Haven works to establish a community-based response to interpersonal and family violence through advocacy, education, prevention, resource development and treatment. The Haven operates an 18-bed shelter in Houma and runs a legal advocacy program that assists victims of domestic violence in navigating the restraining order process. (Houma)

The Pro Bono Project utilizes volunteer attorneys from across southeast Louisiana to provide free civil legal services to the poor in Orleans, Jefferson, St. Bernard, St. Tammany and Washington parishes. The Pro Bono Project provides services in areas of law ranging from employment, housing, public benefits, family and consumer law. (New Orleans)

The Wellspring Alliance for Families works to strengthen the family and individuals through direct service, education, advocacy and women's leadership. The Wellspring's domestic violence program provides safe shelter, a crisis hotline and legal advocacy for victims in the northeast corner of Louisiana. The Wellspring is an active partner of the Family Justice Center in Monroe, which is a multi-agency collaboration between legal services, social services and law enforcement that provides a coordinated response to the needs of victims of domestic violence. Training, Education and Mediation for Students (TEAMS) serves juveniles in need of education advocacy services in Caddo and Bossier Parishes. TEAMS has court appointed education advocates on staff to serve students who are at risk of becoming involved with the court system or who are already involved with the courts. These advocates ensure that the special education and mental health rights of these young people are honored both by schools and the justice system. (Shreveport)

Volunteers for Youth Justice provides services to middle and high school students who have been in a school fight. (Shreveport)

Winning the Battle, Inc., a faith-based non-profit organization that identifies and assists individuals and families, including those who are incarcerated, win the battle and become free from their addictions and/or destructive behaviors. (Baton Rouge)

Women Outreaching Women helps domestic violence victims in Livingston Parish acquire holistic legal services.

Youth Empowerment Project partners with the Orleans Parish Juvenile Court (OPJC) to help run OPJC's teen court program. The teen court program is a voluntary program in which youth between the ages of 10 and 18 who commit minor offenses are judged by their peers in a mock trial proceeding. The teens are often "sentenced" to community service work, making restitution if appropriate. The program is designed for first time juvenile offenders who have already admitted their guilt. (New Orleans)

Youth Service Bureau of St. Tammany provides advocacy, counseling, education and intervention for at-risk youth and their families, helping them reach their full potential. The program includes courses for young people already involved in the criminal justice system and outreach to more general audiences, like schools. (Bogalusa, Covington, Franklinton and Slidell)

Foundation Programs and Projects

Access to Justice

The Access to Justice Program is a cooperative venture of the Louisiana Bar Foundation (LBF), the Louisiana State Bar Association and the Louisiana legal services programs to support and strengthen an integrated statewide network to increase the delivery of legal services to the poor.

Equal Justice Works AmeriCorps Program

Equal Justice Works AmeriCorps Legal Fellows assist underserved clients in coordination with law student and attorney volunteers. They collaborate with community legal aid providers, colleagues and law schools to ensure quality pro bono opportunities.

Louisiana Appleseed

Louisiana Appleseed is one of 16 chapters of National Appleseed, a network of public interest law centers in the U.S. and Mexico dedicated to building a just society through legal, legislative and institutional structural reform. Louisiana Appleseed asks top private practice lawyers, corporate counsel, law schools, civic leaders and other professionals to commit pro bono time to address problems at their root causes, producing practical, systemic solutions to effect change.

Louisiana Civil Justice Center

The LBF and the Louisiana Civil Justice Center formed a partnership to create a statewide telephone intake system with dedicated staff and systems to provide advice, brief services and referrals for callers seeking legal advice.

Oral History

Oral Histories are video recorded interviews featuring retired judges, bar leaders and other legal personalities.

Scholar-in-Residence

During a two year term, an LBF selected scholar produces an academic work.

Secret Santa

Secret Santa pairs needy children with local attorneys who buy presents from a child's holiday wish list.

Summer Fellowship

The Summer Fellowship Program provides grants to the four Legal Services Corporation offices in Louisiana to allow them to offer paid summer internships to Louisiana law students.

Law Signature School Courtroom Project

The Law Signature School Project provides funds for building a courtroom within high schools that have been designated as "Law Signature Schools" by the Louisiana Center for Law and Civic Education. Law Signature Schools have a core, law-related education curriculum. This project builds upon the law signature program by collaborating with partners to create a courtroom environment for students. The Louisiana Bar Foundation (LBF) project goal is to foster interest and participation in the legal profession and to provide a better understanding of the justice system. Regardless of ultimate career choices, students will profit from having a greater understanding of the law and the political process.

LBF partnered with Lake Charles-Boston Academy of Learning and built the second LBF classroom to courtroom. It is a fully functioning courtroom at their Lake Charles campus. The courtroom is fitted with judge, jury and advocate seating and serves as the setting for mock trial competitions, speaker functions and future court proceedings. The first LBF courtromm was built at Northside High School in Lafayette in Spring of 2009.

Fellows Class Project

In partnership with Louisiana Appleseed, the LBF Fellows Class Project is a way for Fellows to become involved and be a part of the LBF mission.

The Class of 2009's project, focusing on domestic violence (DV), began in January, 2010. Fellows have written a statutory analysis on the classification of strangulation as a felony or a misdemeanor in DV cases. The Fellows are adding legislative history and anecdotal information to complete the project.
