## WHO WE ARE

The Louisiana Bar Foundation exists to preserve, honor, and improve our system of justice by funding, developing, or otherwise promoting efforts which enhance the legal profession, increase public understanding of the legal system and advance the reality of equal justice under the law.

The Louisiana Bar Foundation is a non-profit 501 (c) (3) entity organized under the state of Louisiana, operating as the largest state funder of civil legal aid.

## WHAT WE DO

We partner with a trusted network of more than 70 organizations that lead community-driven efforts to help families facing non-criminal, civil legal challenges.

Through grants, we provide services that go to the very heart of the health, safety, and security of many of our citizens and their families.

## WHY WE DO IT

While every American has a constitutional right to an attorney in criminal matters, when it comes to civil matters, access to an attorney is not a fundamental right.

With more than 1.7 million people in Louisiana who are potentially eligible for free civil legal aid and the second highest poverty rate in the country, there is an immense necessity for assistance.

We are here to close this gap in our justice system and ensure equal justice and representation for all.

## OUR VISION

We are champions for justice, inclusivity, and equality. Our vision is to ensure that all Louisiana citizens regardless of their background or income level have access to civil legal services that they need.

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE Deidre Deculus Robert, 2023-24 LBF President



It has been an honor and privilege to serve as the 30th president of the Louisiana Bar Foundation. I am proud to be a Fellow of an organization that brings members of our profession together, maximizing our efforts to better the profession, our communities, and ourselves.

Thank you to all of our Fellows for your time, talent, and treasure. If you are not an LBF Fellow, I invite you to join us.

For more than 30 years, this organization has been a vital source of funding for civil legal aid, supporting vulnerable citizens in crucial aspects of their lives. Addressing the challenges posed by rising poverty levels and decreasing funding for civil legal aid is indeed a crucial mission.

This fiscal year, we awarded more than \$12 million in grants for social justice initiatives. These funds, along with countless volunteer hours, allow the LBF to continue its commitment to ensuring that Louisiana's civil justice system is truly accessible.

In addition to a 24% increase in annual sustaining grants this year, the board and staff worked on plans for the responsible use of increased funding. The board approved the following initiatives in January:

- \$1,560,000 for a one-time salary staff bonus to Acadiana and SLLS staff for all LSC staff.
- We awarded Lagniappe Law Lab \$125,000 for a project to place self-service kiosks in courthouses in all 64 parishes; kiosks provide access to the Lagniappe Law Lab resources including legal information, referrals to legal aid programs and access to standardized court forms.
- \$5 million for a future home for the LBF.
- \$4 million to establish LBF Civil Legal Aid Fellowships at the law schools; the fellowships will be designed to enhance interest in civil legal aid careers and build a pipeline of attorneys. The first one will be at Loyola Law School.

Throughout this year, we have worked hard cultivating partnerships and building new relationships with like-minded organizations. We had the privilege of collaborating with the LSBA for various events this year, working together to train our leadership, extend a warm welcome to new bar members, engage with the justice community, and impart valuable insights to law students about the significance of civil legal aid. This partnership plays a pivotal role in advancing our shared mission of ensuring civil legal aid for all by expanding our collective impact. We traveled across the state to visit with our counterparts on our Pop Up Tour. Our goal was to meet them where they are and to bring the foundation to them. We met with local lawyers, grantees, judges, shared a meal, and gained meaningful insight into their regional needs.

We also had a great meeting with the Louisiana Supreme Court and shared our vision to ensure access to equal and fair representation of the poor in Louisiana. We thank the Louisiana Supreme Court for their continued support.

We continue to work with the State of Louisiana through an agreement with the Office of the Louisiana State Treasurer. This partnership enables LBF to secure funding for legal representation of children in child protection cases and adult civil legal services to the indigent. We expanded our relationship with the state in July with an agreement with the Louisiana Housing Corporation LBF receives funding for education, counseling, and direct representation of impoverished citizens in matters of title clearing (homeowner foreclosure), foreclosure prevention, mediation, and mortgage loan modifications.

I firmly believe that each of these partnerships and collaborations, among many others, constitutes the very foundation of our success.

Some other highlights of this year include:

In partnership with Lagniappe Law Lab, launching the **Justice Bus**, a mobile, rolling legal resource that brings civil legal services through virtual self-help tools and physical resources to those who need them the most.

Providing a one-hour professionalism CLE to attendees of the **Pop Up Tour** through 9 regional events highlighting civil legal aid, increasing client needs, and rural legal deserts.

Holding two **Past Presidents Advisory Council luncheons** allowing for many LBF past presidents to engage in current activities.

Operations is leading the efforts to move all LBF software to cloud-based systems creating a digital office and managing our current staff, the largest to date.

In addition, our committees have been working hard, achieving many great successes contributing to a year of great advancement.

The **Communications and Education Committees** work to create and design content and messaging, and focus on the marketing and delivery of messaging and outcomes. Several volunteers presented our CLE "**Why the LBF is Good for the Profession**" to various audiences including the state bar annual meeting.

**Speak Out for Justice! Focus on Civil Legal Aid** continues to engage content creators who develop a public awareness-focused or research-focused project to increase understanding of the need for civil legal aid.

The **Oral History program** added several new interviews to the online collection.

The **Development Committee** worked on **Membership** and **Lifetime Giving** with focus on outreach opportunities to expand our membership and increase engagement. The **Gala** continues to be the highlight and culmination of the Foundation's year-round efforts.

**My Community Cares Committee** is dedicated to the work of MCC, a community-driven neighborhood-based approach to preventing child abuse and neglect in Louisiana. In the 2023-24 fiscal year, the committee recommended funding for 5 full-time attorneys fully dedicated to the work of MCC handling cases in the categories of domestic violence and family law, public benefits, consumer health and protection by providing legal representation, advice, and expertise to families before moving into the DCFS system.

The **Diversity Equity and Inclusion Committee** partnered with K. Allen Consulting to perform a DEI audit to better understand the landscape of DEI within the organization, particularly as it pertains to how the organization engages with its members. While membership was the primary focus of the audit, the KAC team also interacted with staff, board members, charter Fellows, grantees, and the entire LBF membership base throughout the process.

The **Finance Committee** is diligently involved in compliance reviews of the IOLTA Program. Additionally, the committee is vigilant in monitoring cash flow, steadfast in establishing and maintaining appropriate reserve allocations, and remains committed to the ongoing development and implementation of optimal financial practices. The **Governance Committee** oversees the ongoing review of existing policies, governing documents, and insurance coverages for the organization. The committee conducted the second Board self-assessment designed to engage members in the process of measuring its effectiveness. The committee is also reviewing and approving the revised employee handbook.

The **Grantee Audit and Training Committee** worked to satisfy grant award audit stipulations requiring in-person team review of grantee administration and operations and provided civil legal aid network training aimed at strengthening grantee management. The committee facilitated annual Grantee Board and Staff Training focusing on financial audits, board responsibilities, board engagement and review of bylaws. To maximize participation, the sessions were held over two-days and on-line.

The **Grants Committee** reviewed grant applications and made recommendations to the Board of Directors with respect to the disbursement of available grant funds. Annual compliance reporting and review continued throughout the year.

The **Investment Committee** provides oversight and management of nearly \$30 million in assets. The managed funds are split between Hancock Whitney Trust/Asset Management and Crescent Wealth Advisors.

Serving as the LBF President, I am reminded how practicing law is more than a job or even a career, it's a privilege. And I believe there's a responsibility that goes with that privilege, and that's to give back to our profession and the people who need protection but who aren't being served. For me that is the essence of serving the LBF.

Thanks to all of you who contribute to the important work of the Bar Foundation. It has been my great honor to be a part of this dynamic organization.

welfare services, housing, and unemployment.

The LBF Kids' Chance Scholarship Program is the state chapter of a national organization that awards scholarships to the children of Louisiana workers who have been killed or permanently and totally disabled in an accident compensable under a state or federal Workers' Compensation Act or law.

Each year one of every 50 Louisiana workers will be injured on the job. Some of these work accidents will result in death or permanent and total disability. Families of these individuals will face difficult challenges as they struggle to overcome the financial burden of these losses. Often a child's dream of going to college is crushed because of unexpected income loss and/or the necessity to forfeit an education for work to financially support other family members. To these children, the future can appear frightening. Already confronting difficult emotions, they often have to confront the hurdle of funding their education beyond high school.

## The Kids

## \$38,000 Awarded in 2023-2024

**Sarah** from **Lake Charles** attends Lamar University. Sarah's father was severely injured on the job after being struck in the back by a vendor pushing open a cooler, hitting him. This led to severe mobility issues and many years in a wheelchair.

**Blake** from **Houma** attends Southeastern Louisiana University. Blake's father, a pilot, died in a helicopter crash.

**Emma** from **Baton Rouge** attends Louisiana Tech University. Emma's father was at work, on his way to install a generator. He was riding a motorcycle to the job site when he was killed in a horrible accident. A truck making a wide turn, came into her father's lane, hit him, then backed over him, and left the scene.

**Tyran** from **New Orleans** attends the University of Louisiana at Lafayette. Tyran's dad died while working when his car plunged from the 5th floor of a parking garage.

**Skyler** from **Baton Rouge** attends The University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa. Skyler's mother became permanently disabled while lifting a very heavy object at work. She suffered torn back muscles, bulging discs and nerve damage.

**Eston** from **Patterson** attends Nicholls State University. His mom, a teacher, was assaulted by a student while trying to stop a fight. This resulted in massive blood clots in her lungs, neck surgery, 3 level fusion, and surgery to repair a torn rotator cuff. This permanently disabled her.

## 2023 DISTINGUISHED JURIST Hon. Elizabeth Erny Foote United States District Court, Western District of Louisiana



Hon. Elizabeth E. Foote serves as a United States District Court judge for the Western District of Louisiana with her duty seat in Shreveport. Appointed by Justice John Roberts, Beth serves on the Judicial Security Committee of the Judicial Conference of the United States. Until her appointment to the bench in June 2010, Beth was a partner in The Smith Foote Law Firm, LLP, in Alexandria, where she had been engaged in active practice since 1979. Beth received her undergraduate degree from Louisiana State University with college honors, her Masters of Arts degree from Duke University, and her law degree from the LSU Law Center.

She is a frequent CLE speaker. She has served as an Adjunct Professor at the LSU Law Center in the area of Appellate Advocacy and as an instructor on motion practice in the law school's "intersession" program. Beth was the first woman to serve as an officer in the Louisiana State Bar Association when she served as Treasurer. She has also served on the LSBA Board of Governors and the House of Delegates. She has chaired numerous committees for the LSBA and was presented with the 1994 President's Award for outstanding service in the area of Continuing Legal Education. Beth's service to the bar culminated in the office of LSBA President from 2008-2009. In her new home of Shreveport, she has served as the 2011 chair and 2013 co-chair for the Shreveport Bar Association CLE Committee and as an officer in the Booth-Politz Inn of Court. Beth is married to W. Ross Foote, a partner in a mediation and arbitration firm, whom she met on their first day in law school.

Harry J. "Skip" Philips, Jr. is Of Counsel at Taylor, Porter, Brooks & Phillips in Baton Rouge where he has practiced since graduating from the LSU Paul M. Hebert Law Center in 1983, where he was Editor-in-Chief of the Louisiana Law Review and elected to Order of the Coif. Skip also served as Managing Partner of Taylor Porter for nine years. ## 2023 DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR John K. Pierre Southern University Law Center




Chancellor John K. Pierre has devoted his career to molding lawyer leaders and being a champion of innovation. He received a bachelor's degree in accounting from Southern University in 1980, a master's degree in tax accounting from Texas Tech University in 1982, and a juris doctor degree from Southern Methodist University School of Law in 1985.

After graduating from law school, from 1986 to 1990, Pierre served his country as a Judge Advocates General Corps Officer, or JAG, for the United States Army. In 1990, his next assignment led him to the classroom as he began serving as a faculty member at the Southern University Law Center. In 2006, he transitioned to a leadership role within the institution becoming the vice chancellor of institutional accountability and the evening division. Currently, he has been serving as the Law Center's chancellor since 2016.

Pierre has earned numerous awards for his leadership, innovative strategy, and tireless efforts within the legal and professional realm, including Educator of the Year from the Thurgood Marshall College Fund and Ten Most Dominant HBCU Leaders from The HBCU Campaign Fund.

The Calogero Justice Award is named in honor of Chief Justice Pascal F. Calogero, Jr. who was elected to the Louisiana Supreme court in 1972. Calogero was sworn in as Chief Justice in 1990 and served on the Court for 36 years. At the Annual Fellows Gala the Louisiana Bar Foundation honors an individual or organization for a significant contribution to the Louisiana justice system.

Bernard Boudreaux has been an associate with the law firm of Jones Swanson and Huddell LLC since 2013. He received a B.A. degree from the University of Louisiana at Lafayette and his J.D. degree from the LSU Paul M. Hebert Law Center in 1961. Upon graduating from Law School he entered the U.S. Air Force as an attorney in the Judge Advocate Generals Department wherein he immediately began trying courtsmartial. While in the Air Force he served as an adjunct professor for Ohio University.

He was an adjunct professor for eight years at the LSU Law School. Professor Cheney Joseph and he gave many CLE lectures on criminal law and then he co-authored a book published by West Publishing Company, *Sentencing Guidelines Manual*. He served for decades and continues to serve on the Louisiana State Law Institute and on its committee to enact the Louisiana Code of Evidence during which time he spent immeasurable hours working with Professors George Pugh, Robert Force and Gerald Rault, the authors of the Evidence Code, which became law in 1988.
